Of the 83 students in the Tutoring Program, 33 are new this year. Many are relatives of other students in the program, but many are the first in their family to be in the program. Eight students in the program are sons or daughters of "tutoring grads." Many are relatives of tutoring grads. Parents want their children to have the same good experience they had.

NEWS ABOUT STUDENTS

A four-year old child in a tutoring family was not enrolled in school. We bought her a simplified preschool workbook so she could begin learning, and she loves it! Her sister, Layla S., 2nd gr., helped her understand the directions for some of the pages. She figured out other pages by herself. Hurray!

This year Leonardo M., 2nd gr., is a wholly different student compared to last year. Here he is in Sept. 2015: Leonardo M., 1st gr., entered the tutoring program bawling. He cried, didn't talk, and bit pencils for four weeks. Various tutors tried different things to work with him. Rorie tried art. Zak tried tug of pencil. One tried talking in Spanish to him. Nothing worked, although the tutor usually helped him complete the worksheets of his homework. In Week Four of the Tutoring Program something happened. Leonardo was a changed person! He didn't cry. He walked willingly with the other children to the library, even helping to push the cart full of folders. He eagerly did his homework. We don't know how this happened. We are just in awe.

Last year, in first grade Leonardo was in the program only until December, but in 2nd grade he is back because the tutoring director walks him home along with a small group of other students. And this year Leonardo is still a changed person. He leads the students walking from school to the Tutoring Program. When he gets there, he sits down and immediately begins his work. On the first day he did his math homework and read "Tip 3." Last year in September he couldn't read any words. We are happy for Leonardo and hope he will continue to do well.

Jovanny S., 8th gr., along with Jose L., 8th gr., Jason L., 8th gr., and Miguel O., 7th gr., are on Goudy's soccer team.

The uncle of some tutoring grads was in the library during the tutors' orientation meeting. He remarked afterwards, "What a great group of people!"

(a tutoring grad), who did further preparations while the girls were at tutoring. To top it off, during tutoring, a tutor at the same table as Reaisha had the same birth date as Reaisha! They had fun comparing plans for their celebrations. And both included tutoring in their birthday weekend!

Monday, Columbus Day, was a great day for a Family Night. On that beautiful evening, over 60 people gathered at Epworth Church—parents, students, siblings, performers, and performers' guests. It was a happy event.

The children receiving the gifts were the 1st-4th graders from the Wed./Thurs. afternoon tutoring section and their younger brothers and sisters

In early October, the IY families had given gift suggestions, along with the children’s sizes, to Sue Ready of GUMC for “Whose Birthday is It, Anyway?” In early November, the names, gift suggestions, and a photo of each child were laid out for members of GUMC to choose. Two other organizations also had names for the people to choose. The Glenview families bought gifts for the names they chose and brought them to GUMC the first Sunday in December. Sue Ready’s husband brought the presents for Inspired Youth to Dorie Burrell’s apartment in huge bags. The parents (and children) came to get the presents after school. Everyone was happy. Jason R., a first grader, was so excited he jumped around and couldn’t wait to open his present.

TUTORING GRADS

“My name is Maria Y. Najera. I was a part of the Inspired Youth Tutoring Program in the early 1990s. Those years were full of fond memories of Beth Palmer and the volunteers working to help the kids from Goudy Elementary with their school work. I feel very fortunate to have been part of the program during that time. The program introduced me to many first-time experiences which strengthen my education. I remember, the first time I was taught how to use a computer, how to perform a poem in public, how to carefully complete my homework and be able to double check my work. As a child of only Spanish speaking immigrant parents it was difficult to get assistance at home with school work. This program pivoted me toward a more rounded education. I was able to graduate Goudy grade school. I went on to Mather High School and graduated in the Honor roll. After that, I was accepted to the University of Illinois at Chicago and graduated with a psychology major. Currently, I work as a social worker

with the Department of Human Services. I enjoy working in the community and helping out its residents. I feel this would not have been possible without the assistance from the Tutoring Program.”

Blanca F. is attending Truman College. She came to Chicago from Mexico several years ago and was in the tutoring program for a year. We wish Blanca well.

Fredy F. is also attending Truman College. He was in the Tutoring Program from 3rd grade through early H.S. He plans to be a police officer.

Ariana T., 10th gr., is taking all honors courses at Senn H.S.

Cordell Y., will take one semester of college in Chicago and then transfer to a college in Ohio on a football scholarship. Cortez Y. has three part-time jobs. Both students want to go into music production.

PROBLEMS

A tutoring grad was not able to adjust to being a young adult. He had to be sent to a psyche ward for a few days.

In 2015-2016 there were many seventh graders in Inspired Youth. In 2016-2017 several of the students, now in eighth grade, didn't want to be in Inspired Youth any more. A few of them came to the library with other friends on the first day of the tutoring session, but they did not want to be part of the Tutoring Program. They sat at together at a large table in the Reading Room and were so noisy that, after several warnings, the librarian asked them to leave. On the way out, several of them banged on the glass window. The librarian said that with that behavior, they couldn't come back to the library. One of the main offenders later apologized, and the students went back into the library.

SINGING FOR THE EDGEWATER COMMUNITY THANKSGIVING SERVICE

“That was the best I've heard the children sing!” remarked Margaret Sullivan, a board member of Inspired Youth. Five other people—complete strangers---complimented the choir on how well they sang at the Edgewater Community Thanksgiving Service.

On the Sunday before Thanksgiving, 21 children with 9 adults and 2 other children went to Immanuel Lutheran Church to take part in the Community Thanksgiving Service. This was the third year the Inspired Youth Singers and the Epworth Church School Singers were a part of the program. This year they sang “Firm Foundation,” with Jasmine Tripp conducting. SINGING FOR THE SHELTER MEAL

The Inspired Youth Singers performed carols and other songs for the holiday meal which Epworth Church puts on annually for Epworth's Overnight Men's Shelter. This year the children sang 18 songs, for 50 minutes. 20 children were in the choir; 15 were singing for the shelter meal for the first time! Not only that: many of the children were very young; 9 of the 20 children were 1st graders, kindergartners, or preschoolers! Not only that: most of the songs were new to many of the children, but everyone

sang all the songs with gusto. Dorie Burrell conducted the choir. Jasmine Tripp helped keep the children in order. For one of the songs, Estefany V., 7th gr., led the hand motions. Three children played the piano accompaniment for songs, Leonela C., 6th gr., Gregorio F., 5th gr., and Phyllis R., 4th gr. Leonela and Gregorio had just learned to play the piano last summer in Inspired Youth's 2016 Summer Piano Program. SINGING AT ALL AMERICAN NURSING HOME

Two days after Christmas 20 children from the Inspired Youth Singers and the Epworth Church School Singers sang at the All American Nursing Home. They sang 17 Christmas and secular songs, for a total of 40 minutes. The remarkable thing is that 12 of the 20 children were 4 to 7 years old, and that this was the first time 14 of the children had ever sung in a nursing home! All 20 children (plus one father) sang all 17 songs well.

Fatima E., 8th gr., accompanied 3 songs, and Leonela C., 6th gr., accompanied one song on the keyboard (she had just started playing the keyboard last summer at Inspired Youth's Summer Piano Program). Itzel V., 4th gr., led the hand motions for one song. Jasmine T., a tutoring grad, directed the choir. At the end of the concert the students acted out "freeze motions" to a special CD and enjoyed refreshments. It was a joyous day.

CROP WALK, 2016

19 people from Inspired Youth and Epworth Church walked the 2-mile CROP Walk in downtown Chicago to raise money to alleviate world hunger. The group raised \$317, quite a bit more than last year.

Everyone gathered for preliminary activities at St. James Episcopal Cathedral on N. Michigan Avenue. Melissa D., 8th gr., from Inspired Youth, started helping with face-painting the walkers. Others listened to a fantastic keyboard player and percussionist, who could be heard for blocks around.

Notable in the Epworth/Inspired Youth walkers was a 75-year old man who used a 4-pronged cane because of an artificial hip. Also in the group were pre-schoolers ages 1, 3, and 5. All three youngsters were perfect angels on the walk. Everyone walked the whole 2-mile route.

The Epworth/Inspired Youth group wore bright blue shirts, which they selected at Epworth before they went downtown. Myonna J., 6th gr., thought the 1-year old girl should wear a shirt, too, so she selected the smallest size for her--It was down to the baby's ankles, and she loved the shirt. At the end of the trip, the toddler didn't want to give the shirt back. Perhaps she saw how important the CROP walk was!

The group took the CTA bus downtown and back. On the way home, a woman with a baby-carriage got on and sat near the front. The bus driver said, "You have to fold up the baby-carriage. You can't leave it in the aisle." The woman argued with him. The bus didn't move. The bus, with a full load of passengers, sat for 3, 4, 5 minutes. Finally, Ian F., a father from Inspired Youth, walked to the front and said to the woman, "Let's work this out. You (pointing to the passengers in the side seats) find different seats. We'll fold the seats up, and the baby-carriage can go there." A passenger grumbled, but it was done, and the bus moved on.

Yea, Ian! Once this happened, it was obvious, but no one else thought of it. No one else did it. Yea, Inspired Youth.

HALLOWEEN PARTY 2016

The neighborhood Halloween Party at Epworth Church was a huge success. 75 to 100 people--children, parents, and helpers--came from all over for the exciting event, thanks to flyers made by church secretary Vivian and distributed by Frank Palmer. Four generations came to the party from one neighborhood family. Everyone had a good time.

The costumes were gorgeous: A flirtatious preschool "pumpkin" won the contest for 6 yrs. and under. Phyllis R., 4th gr., a black cat, won for 2nd-5th graders. A special feature of the party was the face painting. Zoria O., 10th gr., and Anyia F., 9th gr. did the most elaborate face painting of any Halloween party. For games, the children played musical chairs (with DJ Marshall M.). They tossed bean bags into a big, orange box pumpkin, painted by the Girl Scouts and supervised by Leonela C., 6th gr. They tossed sponge balls into buckets, supervised by Mahelate T., 6th gr. They played musical chairs, led by Mistead S.

Because of the many, fun supervised activities, the children were on their best behavior. An adult helper, Elli H. commented, "The children behave much better here than where I came from." She kept marveling at how the children acted at the party.

TICKETS TO "HAMILTON"

A patron of the Bezazian Branch of the Chicago Public Library gave the library two tickets to the musical "Hamilton," because she couldn't use them. Mark Kaplan, director of the Bezazian Branch, gave them to Inspired Youth, with the instructions that they be used by a student over 16 years old and a tutor. Mr. Kaplan had seen the production and judged that it wasn't for children.

The two who went to see the play were tutoring director Beth Palmer and former student Jasmine Tripp. Jasmine, a tutoring grad, is now a tutor, and a good singer.

In order to prepare for the play, Jasmine and Ms. Beth listened to the entire musical on YouTube, while following the script, which covers American history from 1775 to 1804.

The tickets (purchased August 4, 2016) were for the matinee performance on Thanksgiving Saturday. The theater was packed. Every single seat was taken. The people sitting next to Ms. Beth were a family of four from Atlanta. They came to Chicago instead of going to New York to see "Hamilton" because in New York the tickets were three times as expensive. These mezzanine tickets were \$150-\$225.
