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STUDENTS DO GOOD WORK

Rodrigo A., 3rd gr., is making fantastic progress. When he enrolled in the Tutoring Program in September 2017, his written work was poor. He covered it up by writing very small and illegibly. By February he was reading better, spelling accurately, and writing coherently. He has gained a lot from the Tutoring Program this year.

<u>Layla S.</u>, 3rd gr., is reading books on her own at home. Layla checked out a book from the library by Tomie DePaola. She loved it. Now she is taking out other books from the library.

Michelle F., 3rd gr., loves to read graphic novels from the library. In the Tutoring Program she is working on writing complex sentences. She is doing better.

<u>David C.</u>, 2nd gr. drew an excellent, detailed picture of a neighborhood fire for the cover of Sunshine magazine.

<u>Donovan F.</u>, 1st gr., is a student in the Saturday Tutoring Program and sings in Inspired Youth Singers. In the spelling bee at his public school, Walt Disney Magnet School, he beat the other first graders *and* the 2nd graders. He was bested by a 3rd grader on the word "harvest." Yea, Donovan! His father, <u>Ian F.</u>, encourages him and is proud.

<u>Kayla S.</u>, kindergarten, learned to read simple words in one day, in May. That same day she learned to add. The next week she learned how to subtract. ... Kayla has always had a hard time pronouncing letters like <u>k</u> and <u>gh</u>, which are in the back of the throat. She practiced them over and over, *on her own, by herself!* Finally, she learned to say them. She is motivated!!!

We're working hard with 6^{th} grader \underline{K} . He often doesn't do his homework during the week, so he has missing assignments. He should be doing better than he is.

M., 8th gr., is very capable, but he doesn't want to do the details. We think he will start to do better.

A tutor was reluctant to work with 8th grader, N., because in previous years N. was hard to work with. Now it's completely different. N. concentrates the whole tutoring session. The tutor enjoyed working with him. N. always got a lot of D's and a sprinkling of F's on his report card. On his April report card, he got all C's and one B! We can hardly believe it. His tutor said N. is starting to do his homework because he wants to play football in high school and he has to have a certain grade average to do it. N.'s father didn't graduate from high school and has always regretted it. He drives his son to tutoring (most kids walk), and he always worries about him. N.'s report card shows he is finally starting to try. This is good news!

WEEKDAY TUTORING: MON., WED., THURS.

Weekday tutoring is the backbone of the Tutoring Program. Students came to Bezazian Library every week to work on homework and other reading, writing, and arithmetic assignments. Fifth grade through HS students came Monday evenings; 1st-4th graders came on Wed. and Thurs. afternoons. The math homework was often difficult, and the tutors from the neighborhood and from New Trier HS were wonderful at helping the students. Some students did IXL math homework on the library's computers. Students also needed work in writing basic sentences. All the students gained.

SATURDAY TUTORING:

Good Relations, Good Writing, Good Projects

In the Saturday Tutoring Program 51 8th graders from Wilmette Jr. High School come to Chicago every other Saturday to work with pre-school through 8th graders from Uptown/Edgewater. All the students do excellent work. They spend an hour as tutoring pairs doing individualized reading, writing, and arithmetic assignments which the tutoring director prepares. Then they spend two half-hours each session doing various projects, e.g., writing, conflict resolution, free time on the playground equipment, and other activities. All these activities provide an opportunity for wholesome educational relationships.

A special feature of the program is the writing assignments planned by Ms. Stephanie Deininger and Mr. Jon Rennels, teachers at Wilmette Jr. High School. The writing projects are a wonderful experience for all the students. The first writing assignment was "Brown Bag Short Stories," where students were given an arbitrary "character," "setting," and "conflict/problem" and asked to write a fictional short story using them. The Saturday tutoring pairs along with a few students from the weekday tutoring program wrote a total of 55 "Brown Bag Short Stories," all very imaginative and very creative.

In other writing assignments, 52 children wrote forceful editorials on various topics under the rubric, "Here's What I Think," 24 upper elementary Chicago children wrote stories based on pictures from different parts of the world, 22 students wrote articles on various countries in the world, and 20 younger children wrote stories for our magazine "Sunshine."

The last day of Saturday tutoring was warm, with a temperature in the 80s. After an excellent session of tutoring, the 8th gr. tutors and the Chicago students played games on the lawn of Margate Park. Then they had a pizza party, with huge slices of thick pizza. The kids gulped down the pizza and lined up for seconds and thirds. It was a wonderful day.

MONDAY EVENING FAMILY NIGHT

Parents' Night for the 5th-8th graders was one of those "perfect days." It was gorgeous. 47 people came to the Family Night—students, parents, siblings, and tutors. (37 people came to last year's Family Night.) Everyone enjoyed it.

18 students recited poems by memory, humorous poems, poems about people, poems about nature, and inspirational poems. All students did well. Exceptional were <u>Dayveana B.</u>, 5th gr., reciting "Double Dutch"; <u>Leonela C.</u>, 7th gr., reciting "The Road Not Taken"; and <u>Gregorio F.</u>, 6th gr., reciting the first part of "Paul Revere's Ride." The audience applauded loudly for the poems, which were announced by <u>Miguel O.</u>, 8th gr., and <u>Yasmine H.</u>, 8th gr., both of whom did very well. Tutor <u>Meghan Ford</u> took great pictures.

A group from the Inspired Youth Singers led the audience in singing a few songs. Accompanying the songs on the keyboard were <u>Gregorio F.</u>, 6th gr., <u>Leonela C.</u>, 7th gr., <u>Itzel V.</u>, 5th gr., and <u>Raul V.</u>, 2nd gr.

After the singing and the poems everyone got to enjoy pizza, soda, and cookies. It was a beautiful evening.

AFTERNOON FAMILY DAY, 1st -4th GRADERS

The Spring Family Day for the 1st-4th graders (and siblings) of the Tutoring Program was spectacular! 31 students came, along with 11 tutors, and 24 parents from 19 out of 21 families! This may be a record! The 24 parents included 4 fathers and one grandfather. 11 younger siblings also came.

28 children recited poems into the microphone, mostly by memory. The children's choir of 11 students led the group in singing 5 songs, 3 with child accompanists (<u>Jordynn J.</u>, 2nd gr.; <u>Raul V.</u>, 2nd gr.; and <u>Eduqrdo F.</u>, 6th gr.). The announcer, <u>David C.</u>, 2nd gr., did an excellent job. The photographers, tutors <u>Marshall M.</u> and <u>Zak Yasin</u>, were wonderful. Their photos are on Inspired Youth's Face Book page. The afternoon ended with delicious pizza, slurpy pouches of pop, and yummy chocolate chip cookies. It was a beautiful day.

"SILVER AWARD" ART PROJECTS

The second art session was working with water colors. The children experimented with colors, with cleaning the brushes, and with mixing colors. As a bonus, each child got to take home the trays of 24 water colors and the four beautiful, expensive brushes.

In the final art session, the children used graphite (special lead pencils) and colored pencils, and blended the colors with a special white pencil stick. The children loved it and were completely engrossed.

Even the parents loved dyeing eggs. Everyone was excited and engrossed.

After dyeing eggs for the residents for Easter, the children were treated to a raffle, led by Ms. Shawn G. The children have never been so attentive as they were waiting to see if their number was picked. As it turned out, every child finally got a prize. What a glorious day!

TUTORING DIRECTOR HONORED

Tutoring director, Beth Palmer, was honored at the Spring Banquet of the Edgewater Historical Society as her work with children for over three decades was announced. She was selected as one of three "Living Treasures" of Edgewater, a community of 50,000 in Chicago. In 2014, 52 people were selected as Living Treasures. Since then, four people were selected every year. Surprising Ms. Palmer at the Spring Banquet were IY Board Chair, Margaret Sullivan, Treasurer, Kenny Roman, and long-time tutor Jim Conlon who was representing Heather Conlon, former IY Board Chair.

In the actual ceremony honoring the "Living Treasures" on Saturday, June 9, 2018, at the Edgewater Library, 14 adults, 2 high school students, and 4 children from the Tutoring Program and the choirs surprised Ms. Palmer by being there. Ms. Palmer was introduced in a wonderful speech by <u>Ken Roman</u>, a tutoring grad and tutor who is also on Inspired Youth's Board of Directors. Ms. Palmer was honored with a "Living Treasure" plague from the Edgewater Historical Society and bouquets of flowers

from students <u>Roberto S.</u> and <u>Yahir S.</u>, and <u>Rosetta Pillow</u>, a former tutor and grandmother of several tutoring grads. For Ms. Palmer's acceptance remarks, she displayed an acrylic and mirror art-work of the sun created by tutoring grad <u>Larry White.</u> The art-work was on display on a music stand during the entire program. The whole ceremony honoring the "Living Treasures" was beautiful.
